## Well Dressing

Congratulations to this year's 'well dressers' - the design by Eunice Jennings had all the right elements and the eventual effect of the completed picture by our team of petallers was quite stunning.

The finished article is the product of many hands and many hours of time. Firstly the clay is fetched out of store and 'puddled' in a bathtub with water and left to soak for several days; the wooden frames are prepared and the clay is smoothed into them.

Meanwhile the design has been 'enlarged' onto large pieces of paper at the size required and each colour block is 'outlined' - the resulting 'cartoons' look a little like a 'painting by numbers' design. These are placed over the clay panels and the outlines are 'pounced', ie needle points are pricked along the pattern of lines so that the design is transferred to the clay beneath.

The paper is removed and the colour blocks filled with appropriate petals, leaves, seeds or other bits of 'natural' material. This 'petalling' process usually begins on the Sunday of Gala Week and will take the team three days of full-time working to complete the picture
